What did we do?	The consultation process included writing directly to the following stakeholder groups:

- Rewarding good custodians of heritage
- More regular review of heritage lists and listings
- Both 'stick' and 'carrot' strategies to prevent deterioration of heritage buildings
- Programs to share and learn more on how to conserve heritage buildings including lessons learned, guidelines and tips
- Showcasing Council-owned heritage buildings including more public access, appropriate uses and conservation activities
