SITE CONTEXT AND PRINCIPLES (CONCEPT ONLY)

ABOUT

We are working with community to develop a plan for an Aboriginal Cultural Centre in PAE. The Centre will be unique, catering for Aboriginal people seeking to share, learn and practice culture and creating a welcoming place for non-Aboriginal visitors to learn about Aboriginal culture and the rich history of the region.

The idea of an Aboriginal Cultural Centre has been discussed over the last 20+ years. Council's Aboriginal Advisory Panel has been instrumental in driving this project. Following discussions between Council and the Aboriginal Advisory Panel, Council has approved a study to determine whether the project is feasible. This will include a concept plan (to outline what the centre could look and feel like) and business case (to show that the project is valuable) which will be presented to Council in early 2022.

We recognise the importance of appropriately considering and reflecting Aboriginal Culture within the design and development of this project. We also recognise that to ensure this happens the project needs to be developed with the Aboriginal community.

A Place of Healing


















Rivers and creeks healing the site
